










#### Some Key Messages



- 9 in 10 believe the our climate change policies should be guided by science and expert advice, as was the case with Covid-19.
- There is near-universal support for government initiatives to support jobs by encouraging home improvements for energy efficiency.
- 3 out of every 4 citizens in Ireland believe that investment in transport should favour safe walking, cycling and public transport ahead of private cars. It hits 80% in Dublin, but is still 72% outside cities and suburbs.
- Even with very difficult economic times ahead, almost two-thirds of adults in Ireland believe that it remains important that the government prioritises action on climate change.
- Two-thirds of people living outside cities and suburbs believe emissions from agriculture need to be reduced by supporting a move to more sustainable farming. Nationally it is three-quarters.




#### **Government Focus on Climate Change**

7 in 10 Irish citizens feel that a failure to act on climate change is a failure to act in the best interests of the people of Ireland.

This view is held most strongly among those aged under 35, with 76% agreement in that cohort.
